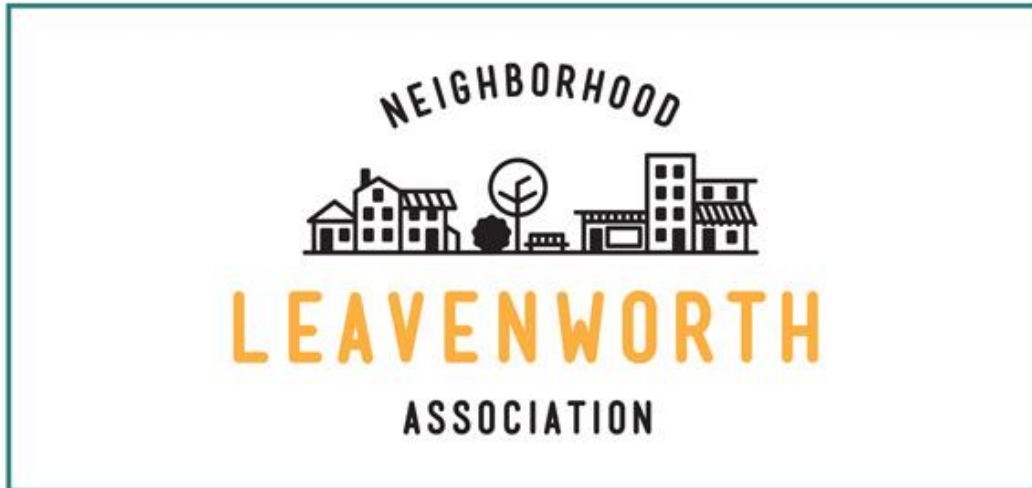

LNA was recently added to this an app-based tool that allows organizations to raise money in a way that is easy, fun, routine and socially influential.

When TAGG is used at participating businesses, the business will donate 5% of the TAGGED purchase to the organization of your choice (ahem, LNA of course!). Some of the funds may be matched by corporate sponsors and TAGG will make extra donations when milestones are met. All donations are sent to our account on a monthly basis.

I said it's routine because it is. Mug Life is usually part of my morning routine, and I TAGG for LNA every time. It just takes seconds! I TAGG when I get my hair cut every two weeks. And there are multiple restaurants in Midtown Crossing that partner with us via TAGG. It's easy and it helps LNA!

This is a great way for LNA to raise money incrementally without asking for a dime. We simply raise funds as our supporters go about their normal routines. TAGG also allows our organization to gain support from people who not otherwise contribute financially. Currently we have 10 active supporters - as we move into the holiday season, let's double that number. Imagine the exponential impact of 20 individual people supporting LNA all across our city!

So how does it work?

Step One: Download the TAGG app.

Step Two: Visit participating businesses and scan the QR code or snap a picture of the receipt.

Need data? Check out "The Landscape".

One of the things neighborhood groups struggle with is gathering data, a common component of most grant applications.

Thanks to our friends at the [Omaha Community Foundation](#) (OCF), a new data-driven resource is now available locally: [The Landscape](#). The project examines six areas of community life and reflects the actual experiences of residents in the Omaha-Council Bluffs metro.

With the help of its community partners, The Landscape has gathered a large amount of publicly available data and made it easy to access. The first two focus areas - *Health* and *Neighborhoods* - are now online.

The neighborhood section has data on housing affordability, housing quality, home ownership and homelessness. Its "what you can do" section enables you to share your experience, connect with a nonprofit and get involved in the issues that matter most to you. It also has links to six additional neighborhood resources (ONE Omaha is proud to be one of them).

Take a moment to check it out and share it with your neighbors.

OCF said the four remaining focus areas - *Transportation*, *Safety*, *Workforce* and *Education* - will be added during the next few months.

Knowledge is power, neighbors. Please take advantage of this new resource. Together, we can change Omaha, one thing at a time.

Park Ave. Grocery to Close

As long as I have lived in the neighborhood there was a small grocery store at 830 Park Avenue. In 1992 Mick and Mary Ann Caniglia bought the business and subsequently created an institution. This small business became more than a convenience store, carrying the basics needed for those in the surrounding area. Was the huge Hinky Dinky store around the corner going to dissuade these youngsters from starting up the adventure? Not even a concern according to Mary Ann.

So they started out on this new career, followed their gut instincts and put their own touch on what a convenience store can be. They were joined shortly by son Daniel Leutzinger. This being a family business, Dan has been there 24/7 to help make it happen. Prior to this business Mary Ann was a nurse, which explains her ongoing care for all of her customers.

These customers and the level of care and concern provided by "Park Av", will be difficult to replicate. When Mary Ann answers the phone with the "Park Av" moniker, she doesn't need caller I.D. to recognize who is on the other end. She knows their voice and tone. And when she gets a call that so-and-so must be sick, a follow-on call from another neighbor asks how the person is. Where do you find that in a small business? And if it happened to be an employee, someone would show up and help stock the shelves. And Mary Ann would not stop there, many times offering rides to doctors appointments, etc., for her clientele. Nice.

As you might guess a great number of the customers were low or fixed income. Paychecks were very dear to these folks and when time was short, "Park Av" would assist until that check arrived. A simple entry in a 3-ring binder and a comfort level is achieved. Can you imagine any of the 7's, Q's, and Kwiks helping out in that manner? It was nice to have that service become part of the institution and true meaning of neighborhood.

The notion of "I've got your back" seems to be the essence of this little neighborhood institution. Amongst the shelves of life's essentials, the store became a support center for neighbors. One cannot put a price on that type of inventory.

One item of nostalgia that will be missed is the black Corvette coin operated ride. With the license fees,

vending fees, etc., the 25 cent revenue never did pay for the operation. But "Momma Mary", known by the kids that came to ride, felt honored and privileged to see these kids grow up and subsequently put their youngsters on the same machine.



I asked Mary Ann if they had ever been robbed. One time a "gangbanger" grabbed some beer and ran out. Mick chased him down and got the beer back but the thief got away. Upon returning to the store he was panting heavily. Family took him in and sure enough, discovered some blockage in those arteries. The police were hoping they would find the culprit before one of the neighbors did. So, how do you spin that snatch and grab? We're glad Mick survived.

In the old "absentee landlord" days, there were Bloods to the north, Crips to the south. It is wonderful how things have changed to the positive. Even stop and go traffic across the street was watched by someone at "Park Av". This was neighborhood watch at its core. There was always a family member at the store to be on the lookout.

With numbers down and the neighborhood changing, and with the years racking up, the time seemed right to



make the big move. There have been countless stories
