Summer is here and it's a great time for the neighborhood! It means attending John and Lisa Costanzo's Kick-Off-To-Summer-Party, which always brings a diverse group of neighborhood friends and good food and drinks. Summer brings lazy, long evenings and morning coffee on porches but that doesn't mean Leavenworth isn't bustling.

The renovation start date on the Dewey Building was delayed by a month but is now imminent. The month delay means we'll be out of the building through October rather than the early September as we originally thought. The exciting Dog Park is still on track.

Also in the works, and only in the exploratory phase, is a partnership with Midtown2050 & several other stakeholders in Dewey Park. Turner Park is owned by the City of Omaha but privately managed. Midtown2050 is interested if a similar model for Dewey Park would be successful. It would mean the creation of another 501(c)3 but would provide the ability to program the park and care for it at another level than what is currently taking place. These plans are in the very early stages of conversation.

New Dog Park at Dewey!!

Mayor Stothert held a press conference on June 6 to announce the building of a dog park in Dewey Park. This structure will cover about 1/3 of an acre and be placed between the handball court and the building.

Existing dog parks are at Heflinger and Hanscom, but this one is expected to be a much fancier and sophisticated layout. Private and public partnerships will make this a reality.

With the open tennis courts, the clay tennis courts (maintained by the Omaha Clay Tennis Court Association), the horseshoe pits, the handball court, the 1/2 basketball court and of course the playground, Dewey Park is truly a multi-use facility and destined to be a crown jewel in Midtown.

To add to the splendor of this dog park, it is the first one in the metropolitan area that is connected to one of our major trails. The Turner Boulevard Trail is a significant Midtown Trail that will soon be connected to the Field Club Trail. What a great asset incorporated into Midtown.



Growing Green

Although I am by no means an expert horticulturist, I do fall nicely into the category of gardening enthusiast. This year, as it seems we have but for a few mild spring days, skipped directly to the heat of summer, plants will require some additional help to stay vibrant and healthy. I have picked up some tricks along the way in order to preserve the plants I have growing and help support a healthy growing season for not only flowering plants but also vegetables. These tips are what I do in my gardens, and are of course, only intended as suggestions for what you might try if you have struggling plants.



With the arrival of hotter days and nights, I suspend any type of planting. The root structures of most plants are traumatized when replanted and with the added pressure of hot weather, it is easy to lose plants. If you must plant, it is best to look for a cooler stretch in the long-range forecast and forego planting when the days are in the 90s. If you do plant in the heat, it may help to water twice daily to help plants get established. Plants with leaves which turn brown on the edges is typical of plants, which either are getting too much sun or need more water.

Watering should be done early in the morning if possible. Between six and eight o'clock is ideal. This allows plants to have water available as the day heats up. If I miss a morning watering, I wait until later in the afternoon to water as this allows plants water to recover from the hottest part of the day. I always avoid watering

in the later evening. With hot, humid weather, it is easy to get mildew or other systemic diseases when the leaves on your plants stay wet overnight.


Tomatoes fall into this category. No matter the time of day I water my tomatoes, I avoid getting the leaves wet as much as possible. I use a watering can and direct the water to the area around the base of the stem. If the tomato plant is bushy at the base, I prune it by breaking off the small leaves or branches an inch or two up the stem from the base. This allows air to get in and helps leaves that are wet to dry. If mildew does occur, you can try a spray or powder but I have personally never had much luck bringing tomatoes back once mildew spreads. I try to space my tomatoes out so if one get sick it does not spread to the others.

I hope these tips are helpful to you and your gardening efforts There are few things in the summertime which I garner more pleasure from than having beautiful gardens. The vegetables, which are picked off the vine and go directly to the table always seem to taste just a little bit juicer. To bring forth from the earth and produce that which one finds pleasure in or sustenance from is a noble endeavor. Go forth and grow green!






Quick Snips.....





Spring Cleaned-Up

What a pleasant day it was in May to clean up the neighborhood. The 33rd year of doing this and it seems the junk never ends. Yes, 33 YEARS we've been doing the annual clean-up. A number of our volunteers weren't even alive when we started this effort. Special thanks to the City for budgeting this every year as the payback is tremendous.

The pace was easy and we only filled 1-1/3 packer trucks. I think that is the lightest amount of trash ever. It should be noted that with the publicity by the City and Keep Omaha Beautiful, a good portion of the trash comes from all over Omaha, not just our neighborhood. Informal inquires found that the donors were spread out, but mostly in east Omaha.

Even though there were only a couple of pick-up trucks doing the running around, we managed to comb the alleys and other hiding places for trash. The find was significantly light compared to past years. I credit that to the positive manner in which property owners and investors have controlled their junk. There continues to a problem between Pacific and Leavenworth/29th and Park Ave. Someday we hope these property owners will discover pride and do something about this unsightly problem.

We collected scrap metal again and the load was light compared to other years. Perhaps because of the constant stream of "scrappers" that roam the alleys, we only collected 2460 pounds. The amount heading to our treasury is \$98.40!! Still worth the effort.

In other years we put re-usable or marketable items aside but did not do that this year. We found a lot of items should have gone to the second hand market vs. throwing into the trash. Perhaps in the future we can concentrate on this better. There are talks of having a flea market within the LNA. If there is anyone out there who would like to adopt that effort please step forward. In addition to other charities, First Lutheran Church and First Congregational Church have second hand sales so consider dropping your items off at these places.

The food menu was considerably light this year compared to prior events. We wish to thank Runza for the donation along with Domino's Pizza. Also the Down Under Lounge provided refreshments. New this year was the donation by Zach Carlberg of fresh fruit and

snack packs of chips. I think this has set a new standard on the future, healthy menu of what to have at this event. Thank you Zach!!

We only found four tires in neighborhood and one appliance. It appears people had read the rules regarding the drop-off sites for these items.

Special thanks to all the volunteers who donated their time and energy. For a lot of you folks this was your initial Clean-Up and I believe there is a good sense of how this volunteerism contributes to the positive outlook of the neighborhood.
