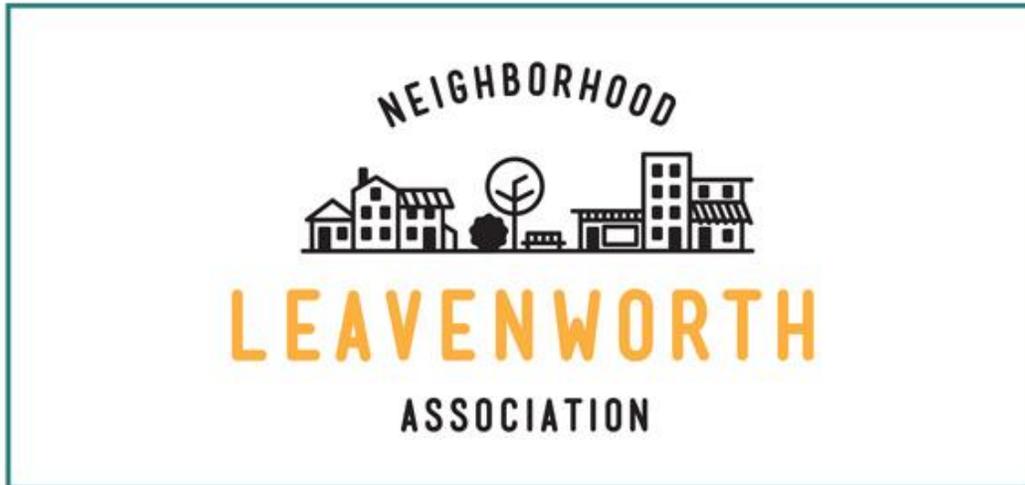

Spring Cleaned-Up !!

The week had been hot & muggy but the Saturday of our 2019 Spring Cleanup dawned and turned out to be an incredibly great day to clean up the neighborhood. This was LNA's 34th year of hosting an Annual Cleanup and it couldn't have been as successful as it was without our dedicated neighbors and volunteers! A special thanks to the City for budgeting this event again this year.

The pace was steady, in fact almost slow at first, and we only filled 1-1/2 packer trucks. Several other sites were diverted to LNA's site in Dewey Park. It should be noted that with the publicity by the City and Keep Omaha Beautiful, a good portion of the trash comes from all over Omaha, not just our neighborhood. Informal inquires found that the donors were spread out, but mostly in east Omaha.

Even though there were only a couple of pick-up trucks doing the running around, we managed to comb the alleys and other hiding places for trash. The find was significantly light compared to past years. I credit that to the positive manner in which property owners and investors have controlled their junk. There continues to be a problem between Pacific and Leavenworth/29th and Park Ave. Someday we hope these property owners will discover pride and do something about this unsightly problem.

We collected scrap metal again and the load was light compared to other years. Perhaps because of the constant stream of "scrappers" that roam the alleys. Still, the amount heading to our treasury is \$110! Still worth the effort. Special thanks to Jesse Smith for using his car trailer to collect another \$67 in the last hour when the metal dumpster was pulled about 1:00 PM.

In other years we put re-usable or marketable items aside but did not do that this year. We found a lot of items should have gone to the second hand market vs. throwing into the trash. Perhaps in the future we can concentrate on this better. There are talks of having a flea market within the LNA. If there is anyone out there who would like to adopt that effort please step forward. In addition to other charities, First Lutheran Church and First Congregational Church have second hand sales so consider dropping your items off at these places.

The food menu was considerably light this year compared to prior events. We wish to thank Burger King

for breakfast and Runza for the donation along with Domino's Pizza for lunch.

We only found four tires in neighborhood and one appliance. It appears people had read the rules regarding the drop-off sites for these items.

Special thanks to all the volunteers who donated their time and energy. For a lot of you folks this was your initial Clean-Up and I believe there is a good sense of how this volunteerism contributes to the positive outlook of the neighborhood.

Community Compost Program

At the last few LNA meetings we have discussed the potential of working with Hillside Solutions to provide a community compost program for our neighborhood, which would be the first of its kind in Omaha. Ashley and I collaborated on a mini-grant offered through the Midtown Neighborhood Alliance and Security National Bank to help offset the costs for the next year while we run a trial period for the program. And we're excited to announce that we got the grant! This is the second grant we've received this year at LNA. This will be a great program that will allow us to reduce our greenhouse gas emissions as a neighborhood by diverting less trash to the landfill, especially when you factor in that the Leavenworth Neighborhood's residents alone may contribute up to 1 million pounds of food waste a year! We also get the benefit of a discount on the finished compost to add to our neighborhood green spaces!

The food scraps that will be composted will be contained in locked bins, likely near the Dewey Park building for an easy-to-access and centralized spot. The bins will be picked up and sanitized weekly by Hillside Solutions. There will be more details to come about when the program is ready to use, as well as what kinds of food scraps and materials are accepted. If you and your household is interested in taking part of LNA's upcoming composting program or if you have any questions, please email Ashley (president@lnaomaha.org) or myself (addiemakes@gmail.com). Also, if you'd like this program to be one of the benefits of the LNA membership long-term, let us know! Limited spots are available during the trial period, and an active LNA membership is required to participate, so get in your membership dues if you haven't, and add your name to the list!

Is (Was?) Our Neighborhood THAT Dirty?

In the 60's my oldest brother had a trash hauling business. As a youngster he needed my help, usually on a Saturday. I learned a lot about handling garbage. I can't say that I was a professional because I don't remember if he ever compensated me. Who would have known that decades later those skills would come into play in my own neighborhood!

I have been involved with the neighborhood clean-up since the beginning. Although the following chart starts with 1986, we may have started a year or two before that. I didn't keep that record. As you can see from this record, a LOT of stuff has gone away. This effort started with Omaha Parks & Recreation and started with open dumpsters, usually 20-yard capacity. As you can guess, the number of dumpsters used required packing the trash effectively to condense the load. Ultimately, the use of packer trucks was instituted and the Public Works Department took over the Clean-up Campaign. Much, much easier.

Over the years the visual appearance of our neighborhood has improved. Proper development, some education on where to dispose of items and more importantly property owners who care have contributed to this positive change. However, there remains an unfortunate number of property owners who have earned the title of Visual Slumlord. Now, this position is merited on what we see on the outside. If what we see on the outside is any indication, I can only guess what the inside looks like. From a neighborhood appearance, go ahead and continue to hide that, but PLEASE clean up your property.

There seems to be zero enforcement from the City to clearing alleys, yards, etc., from mattresses, couches and so on. The alley between Pacific/Leavenworth, 29th/Park Ave. is the worst and the lack of concern on the residents and property owners is disgusting.

Of course not all visual violations are rental units. We do have our share of houses where the owners simply don't give a damn. (Mayor's Hotline: 402-444-5555).

I have always appreciated the intense volunteer help during our annual clean-up. The charts show numbers, but EVERY year the care and sweat shown by our volunteers is something to be proud of.

Note that in 2000 the LNA separated some cardboard and carpet pads (worth a nickel a pound at the time!). And you may wonder why the number of tires totaled 1000 in '01 & '02. This is because we were the host tire site for the neighborhoods. We decided not to do that again. Ask me about the brown recluse sometime. The price of scrap metal has changed dramatically over the decades, but the total weight, estimated to a degree, was 257,346 pounds!!! **That is almost 129 TONS of scrap metal.**

And the effort will continue.....

Mural Update




Sometimes we don't always remember which City department to call for what problem. An easy number to remember is the **Mayor's Hotline: 402-444-5555**.




